<b>School Games Mark – Platinum Award</b>	Fielding's retention of the Platinum School Games Mark highlights the school's exceptional dedication to physical education and inclusive sports programs. By offering daily active minutes, diverse competitions, and leadership opportunities, the school fosters a culture of health and teamwork. These efforts not only improve physical fitness but also promote confidence, social skills, and a positive attitude toward physical activity among all pupils.	Fielding last applied for the School Games Mark in 2022 and automatically retained their Platinum Award. In May 2024, they were asked to reapply and successfully maintain their Platinum Award status.
<b>Success at Competitions run by multiple agencies such as Featherstone, Middlesex Running Club, Ealing Girls Cup, London Youth Games etc.</b>	<p>Success in these competitions boosts the children's confidence and highlights their skills across a range of sports. Access to diverse competitions promotes inclusion for all pupils to achieve in sports irrespective of their ability.</p> <p>Due to increased demand from pupils wanting to join the school football teams, we created a third team for Years 5 &amp; 6, called the Emerging Squad, which includes both boys and girls. This development enabled them to effectively lead the "Project Active" event with 150 participants, support KS1 PE lessons, and run sports days successfully.
